SUMMER BUCKET LIST

Truly Nebraska

Whether you're enjoying a natural wonder (such as the Sandhills' peaceful expanse) or a novel way to experience it (try floating through the Sandhills in a tank), Nebraska delivers plenty of experiences you won't find in many other places.

1) AUTO ART

On a patch of prairie near Alliance, a circle of gray cars rises from the ground, standing strangely vertical. Thirty years ago, an artist created Carhenge, a quirky roadside stop, by positioning vintage American cars to mimic England's prehistoric monument Stonehenge. In Lincoln, the Museum of American Speed's impressive collection of mint-condition hot rods and vintage cars is a work of art in its own right. Retro toy pedal cars, championship racers and much more fill three floors.

2) SPRING MIGRATION

Each spring, more than a halfmillion Sandhill cranes fill central Nebraska skies along the shallow Platte River as they stop to refuel during migration. At dawn and dusk, spectators tuck into chilly viewing blinds to watch massive flocks of the slender gray birds cloud the sky over the Rowe

Sanctuary in Gibbon and the Crane Trust Nature and Visitor Center in Wood River. Eighty percent of the world's Sandhill cranes, as well as millions of migrating geese and ducks, drop by.

3) BOYS TOWN

A century ago, Father Edward Flanagan opened a home in Omaha to provide comfort and direction to struggling youngsters. The place eventually blossomed into Boys Town, one of the country's bestknown charities in the mid-20th century. Today, visitors see students at play and at work, including tending a 22-bed rose garden. The Hall of History Museum captures everyday successes and landmark moments, including Spencer Tracy's Oscar for playing Flanagan in the 1938 movie Boys Town. The priest's house has become a repository, featuring 1920s decor and an elaborate wooden desk made by his students.



CRANE TIP

Reserve a spot before sunrise or sunset in Rowe Sanctuary's viewing blinds. You'll need to stay quiet, but the experience leads to great photos.



4) STARRY NIGHT

With almost no light pollution from cities, stars shine brighter in the night sky at the Merritt Reservoir State Recreation Area, considered one of the Midwest's top stargazing destinations. Stunning astronomical details, typically hidden in more populated areas, shine over this Sandhills lake in the Snake River Valley, more than 20 miles from the closest town of Valentine. Veteran observers converge for the annual Nebraska Star Party, which welcomes newcomers with workshops for beginners.

5) ROMANTIC RIDES

A Venetian-style gondola cruises the serene lagoon at Heartland of America Park,

with striking views of a 320-foot fountain and downtown Omaha's skyline. Those who want to propel themselves can row stand-up paddleboards at Zorinsky Lake in west Omaha, thanks to Driftwood Paddle Adventures. For a view from above, private rides from Lincoln Hot Air Balloons gently float over the countryside at dawn or dusk.

6) MOVIE NIGHT

Carloads of moviegoers wait for dusk to fall and movie screens to light up at the state's handful of remaining drive-in theaters, a taste of nostalgia for some and a new concept for others. Cars fill with soundtracks and the scent of buttery popcorn at the TK-Starlite Drive-In in Neligh and the

Sandhills Drive-In in Alliance. At Sokol Park near the Omaha suburb of Bellevue, campers are also welcome to walk in with folding chairs or blankets to watch films projected on a screen above the grassy grounds.


7) 90-MILE VIEWS

Spectacular views of vast prairie and rocky outcroppings await in Gering on top of Scotts Bluff National Monument, accessible by foot, car or shuttle. Wagon paths cut by early settlers remain at the base of the 800-foot-tall bluffs. Above an old chalk mine near Scotia, a dirt trail leads up to Happy Jack Peak, where a 360-degree view overlooks dusky hills to the west and the North Loup River ambling by farm fields to the east.

STAR CLUB

The Omaha Astronomical Society meets once a month (free and open to the public), and members share their love of astronomy.

8) HEY, KOOL-AID MAN


Nebraska inventor Edwin Perkins created the fruity powdered beverage in 1927, and it wasn't long until Kool-Aid Man, that cartoonish, smiling pitcher with legs, became a pop culture icon. Kool-Aid Man's footprints, cast in concrete at Hollywood's TCL Chinese Theatre, now sit outside the Adams County Convention and Visitors Bureau. At the Hastings Museum, colorful posters and ads show how the beverage evolved over the years, while retro package reproductions brighten the windows at the original factory downtown.

9) TUBING AND TANKING

The stat is surprising enough on its own: Nebraska has more river miles than any other state. Adding to the "Who knew?" factor, outfitters have capitalized on a novel way to see a few of those miles: tanking. Groups picnic and play cards while riding down the river in circular, 8-foot-wide metal livestock tanks, while individuals bob along in inner tubes. Tanks and tubes from Glidden Canoe Rental in Mullen and Calamus Outfitters in Burwell mosey past windswept prairie and dunes in the Sandhills. Chalky bluffs and leafy trees tower over Niobrara River floaters near Valentine.

10) UNUSUAL STAYS

Stately brick buildings and lowslung cottage duplexes that once housed Army officers and soldiers now provide respite to family and friends gathering at Fort Robinson State Park in Crawford, once an Old West military outpost. Roomy porches provide breaks from exploring the park's 22,000 acres of buttes and pines. Along the Missouri River in Brownville, guests gather on sunny decks of the River Inn Resort, a floating hotel anchored to the Missouri River shore, and dine during cruises on The Spirit of Brownville.



Sips & Suds

Toast local. From hip tap rooms to countryside wineries, Nebraska brewers and vintners keep expanding their horizons, crafting new beverages to please every palate. Cheers to that! By Karyn Spencer

SIPS

Summers mean Friday night music at many wineries dotting Nebraska, home to more than 30 wineries and more than 100 vineyards. They grow cold-hardy grapes, such as Edelweiss, Brianna and Frontenac, and supplement their local grape offerings with hard ciders and fruit wines, including the Pioneer Punch rhubarb wine from 17 Ranch Winery in Lewellen. Vintners at Palmyra's Glacial Till Vineyard intensify their wines with

The brandy-enhanced wine makes a nice after-dinner drink.

Nebraska Wine Tours offers behind-the-scenes access to two or three neighboring wineries in an afternoon. The mother-daughter team owners offer a handful of weekend tours in the Lincoln/ Omaha region, plus Grand Island and Norfolk.

The 11th-annual Nebraska Balloon and Wine Festival

in Omaha invites patrons to sample local and regional vintages while watching hot-air balloons at dusk (see below for more information).

WHISKEY RUN CREEK VINEYARD AND WINERY, BROWNVILLE

The rustic tasting room in a century-old barn spans a creek. Historic Brownville blush honors the town near the Missouri River.

MAC'S CREEK WINERY AND VINEYARDS, **LEXINGTON**

Fire pits flicker along the banks of Spring Creek, and Poncu dessert wine caps off a light bite from Prairie Bistro.

SCHILLINGBRIDGE WINERY AND MICROBREWERY, PAWNEE CITY

Guests watch vintners work in a production room at the nation's first farm winery and microbrewery.

JAMES ARTHUR VINEYARDS, RAYMOND

Hills and prairie surround a cozy country-style tasting room and deck at the state's largest winery.

MILETTA VISTA WINERY, ST. PAUL

Pair your wine with flatbread pizzas, fresh salads or prime rib at the onsite restaurant.

HISTORIC KIMMEL ORCHARD AND VINEYARD, NEBRASKA CITY

Walking paths wind past fruit trees and grapevines. Cherry and apple wines liven up tasting menus.

TASTE AND FLOAT

SUDS

From Sandhills cities to small towns to urban downtowns, local craft beer flows from Nebraska taps like never before. Seven years ago, the state was home to fewer than 10 breweries. This summer, guests can visit nearly 40. One downtown Omaha bar built its entire concept on this trend: Local Beer, Patio and Kitchen serves more than 100 Nebraska-made brews. For other chances to find out which local brew you like most, hit one of 50 beer-related festivals around the state, such as the Great Nebraska Beer Fest in Papillion.

To stay abreast of the craft beer craze, follow bloggers like Nebraska Beer (nebraskabeer.com), where you can find out about beer-centric

events, such as festivals and beer-pairing dinners. Or pick up the latest issue of Lincoln-based Perfect Pour magazine at an area brewery, bottle shop or coffee shop.

The local nature of some Nebraska beers goes further back than just the brewing. The Midwest Hop Producers in Plattsmouth is now working together with the University of Nebraska-Lincoln agronomy department's Hops Team. The team provides consumer information for those interested in growing hops themselves. The department also hosts farm tours. which are scheduled to take place in August. The annual Hop Cup at Nebraska Brewing Company in La Vista features brews made with only locally grown hops.

KINKAIDER BREWING COMPANY, BROKEN BOW

A gussied-up steel building gets character from historic photos, beers named for locals and a deck along the edge of the Sandhills.

THUNDERHEAD BREWING COMPANY, **KEARNEY**

Fruity seasonal ales join classics, such as Cornstalker Dark Wheat, and wood-fired pub grub at one of Nebraska's earliest breweries.

SCRATCHTOWN BREWING COMPANY, ORD

Hints of coffee waft from a tulip glass of prize-winning Black Eye Imperial Porter at the salvaged barnwood bar.

LOOP BREWING COMPANY, MCCOOK

Try classic beer styles at an old railroad icehouse and trackside patio. Stupid Pizza of the Week brings unusual pairings, like watermelon pizza with arugula and balsamic vinegar.

EMPYREAN BREWING COMPANY, LINCOLN

Head brewer and Nebraska beer pioneer Rich Chapin leads monthly tours, followed by samples.

BOOTLEG BREWERS, TAYLOR

The smooth Sandhills Cream Ale pairs well with any of the locale's house-made meals. Spend the night in an on-site cabin.

WHAT'S MEAD?

Vikings toasted victories with mead—fermented honey water. Bellevue's Moonstruck Meadery celebrates the ancient drink with a classic Show Mead, Capsumel Pepper Mead and fruit-flavored versions.





Careat Golf

Unforgettable holes fill many of Nebraska's 180-plus golf courses. But for the best scenic views and novel challenges, try these standouts.

HOLE #17, QUARRY OAKS, ASHLAND

Par 4 394 yards

Near the Platte River between Lincoln and Omaha, elevated tee boxes usher players into a limestone quarry some 60 feet below, where a generous landing awaits. Towering bluffs and rocky walls frame the narrow approach to the green surrounded by a pond.

HOLE #2, THE PINES COURSE AT THE PRAIRIE CLUB, **VALENTINE**

Par 5 548 yards

Ponderosa pine trees and a canyon wall buffer players from the alwayspresent wind on this wide-open Sandhills course. But you'll need more than a windbreak to score well on this hole, which has a wide berth off the tee and roughly cut, indigenous landscape lying in wait for the reckless.

DESIGN

Professional golfers who have designed courses in Nebraska include Arnold Palmer, Ben Crenshaw and Jack Nicklaus.







HOLE #10, IRON HORSE GOLF, ASHLAND Par 5 575 yards

An old rock quarry, lake views and difficult elevation changes greet players at this 18-hole course, a few miles from Eugene T. Mahoney State Park. Dubbed the toughest par 5 in the state, No. 10 can ruin a good game unless the ball lands perfectly on minimal green.


HOLE #14, HERITAGE HILLS GOLF COURSE, **MCCOOK**

Par 5 565 yards

Repeat players recommend renting a cart to tackle the hilly terrain of this par-72 course in the Sandhills. They're also the ones who nicknamed the 14th hole Culbertson, the next town west of McCook. Plan on at least three shots just to reach the green.

HOLE #16, MONUMENT SHADOWS GOLF, GERING

Par 5 560 yards

The rocky Scotts Bluff National Monument looms to the west of Monument Shadows, which offers challenging holes and more solitude than most courses provide. Dodging the water hazards lining the narrow fairway, plus the three sand traps surrounding the green, requires accuracy and patience.

HOLE #3. FOUR WINDS GOLF COURSE, KIMBALL Par 3 165 yards


More than 5,000 pine and poplar trees line the fairways of this aptly named course. However, the frequent wind isn't the only challenge. Subtle slopes and slippery greens demand attentiveness. On the third, a three-tiered green coaxes balls toward the pond.

HOLE #14, TATANKA GOLF CLUB, NIOBRARA Par 4 481 yards

Carts are standard at this 7,450-yard course owned by the Santee Sioux Nation. So are grazing buffalo, inspiring the course's name. The old country bridge is original, but before players can cross, the ball must fly 230 yards to carry the canyon.

HOLE #5, LEGEND BUTTES GOLF COURSE, **CRAWFORD**

Par 5 472 yards

The nine-hole Legend lies at the base of the towering Red Cloud Buttes. Looking out from the tees, the fifth hole is a demanding beauty, with brush lining the left and the White River along the right. The fairway bottlenecks while approaching the gently sloping and well-protected green.

HOLE #13, BAYSIDE GOLF. LAKE MCCONAUGHY Par 3 205 yards

The naturally rough prairie terrain surrounding Lake McConaughy (Nebraska's largest lake) comes into play here. To master the 13th, players must tee off toward the reservoir into prevailing winds and over swaths of native prairie grass to a diminutive, curvy and well-guarded green.





HOLE #4, WILDERNESS RIDGE, LINCOLN Par 3 198 yards

Wilderness Ridge challenges with designs, like this lengthy par 3 with a water hazard followed by a dangerous, multilevel green. Luckily, the architects of the 7,100-yard course believe in fairness, too, and provide generous bailout areas just off the green.

HOLE #12, JOHNNY GOODMAN CHAMPIONSHIP GOLF COURSE, OMAHA Par 4 395 yards

The city course, named for the winner (playing as an amateur) of the 1933 U.S. Open, sits on the city's south side, where he grew up. This hole's severe dogleg requires blind faith and luck. Cutting the corner yields a 100-yard gain, but an old-growth tree line, a pair of bunkers and a severely sloped green cause pause.

HOLE #7, WILD HORSE GOLF CLUB. **GOTHENBURG**

Par 4 364 yards

Prairie surrounds No. 7, defined by well-placed bunkers that require two great shots to make par. From the tee, bunkers nudge players to a narrow portion of the vast fairway. A giant trap guards the left of the green with a couple of large mounds off to the right.

THE GREAT

Nebraska native Johnny Goodman was the last amateur golfer to win the U.S. Open, doing so in 1933; he also won the U.S. Amateur in 1937.





NEBRASKA ON

Two Wheels

From relaxing cruises along farmland rail-trails to off-road adventures through pine forests, Nebraska offers a ride for every kind of cyclist.

More than 130 miles of bike trails weave through the capital city, including the MoPac Trail, stretching 27 miles from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln to the small town of Wabash east of the city. One day the MoPac, built on an abandoned Missouri Pacific Railroad corridor, will extend all the way to Omaha.


For now, the MoPac's 5 urban miles follow a greenbelt past backyards and city parks. Beyond the city's eastern edge, past 84th Street, the trail transitions to crushed limestone for the trip past restored prairie and cornfields.

The MoPac offers riders diverse experiences ranging from access to Lincoln shops, restaurants and parks to group rides into the countryside for Tuesday-night nachos at Bailey's Local in Eagle.

"If you go 5 miles, it is the same as 100 miles: smooth, calm amazingness. It is therapeutic," University of Nebraska student Daniel Casburn says.

Around the state, other routes offer a big range of additional outings. The state's distance champ is the Cowboy Recreation and Nature Trail, which covers 195 miles of crushed limestone across the northern part of the state between Norfolk in the east and Valentine in the center of the state. Eventually, it will reach Chadron and its full length of 321 miles. Along the way, find pockets of prairie harbor pheasants, quail and songbirds. Bald eagles swoop over the Elkhorn River, and riders find a signature photo op as they pedal across an old trestle bridge over the Niobrara River.

On the state's eastern side, several popular trails deliver tastes of urban settings and historical pathways. Omaha contains a total of about 120 miles of paved multiuse recreational trails, with 20 miles of the Omaha Riverfront Trail following the Missouri River along former levee roads. In the southeast corner, Beatrice's Chief Standing Bear Trail runs 19-plus miles to the Kansas border and will eventually connect to the Homestead Trail, which leads 40 miles from Beatrice to Lincoln. Between Brownville and Nebraska City, the Steamboat Trace's 22 miles of crushed limestone include 6 miles of Lewis and Clark's

Mountain bikers can easily make a weekend out of a visit to the state's northwest corner. In and around Chadron State Park. 33 miles of trails weave through pine forests and reveal views of the Pine Ridge region. Next door, the adjoining Nebraska National Forest adds another 80 miles of trails within its 146,000-plus acres.

Pioneer landmarks highlight the Monument Valley Pathway, a 6.3-mile trail connecting Scottsbluff, Gering and Terrytown. Chalk hills rise above grasslands along the North Platte River, and Scotts Bluff National Monument, a key marker for wagon trains, looms 800 feet above the river near the trail. Soon to come: 5 more miles for the pathway in Scottsbluff.



Statewide Bike Events

BICYCLE RIDE ACROSS NEBRASKA

June 4–10, bran-inc.org

This annual rural-urban mixer takes 600 riders over 470 miles on its way between small-town stops. The route varies each year for this Rotary-organized event that benefits Nebraska students.

TOUR DE NEBRASKA

June 21-25, tourdenebraska.com

Organizers promise to plan a 30th-anniversary route that catches as many tailwinds as possible, making the miles go more quickly on this 250- to 350-mile, four-night adventure.

7 CITIES CENTURY BIKE RIDE

August 5–6, 7citiescentury.com

Put in back-to-back 50-some-mile days with breaks every 10 to 15 miles. Starting and ending at the

Ta-Ha-Zouka Park clubhouse in Norfolk, riders stop in seven towns, including camping overnight in Petersburg.

GRAVEL WORLDS

August 19, gravel-worlds.com Hills. Many, many hills. In fact, riders in this trek across country roads climb a total of 8,000 to

11,000 feet during the 150-mile loop around Lincoln.

HEATSTROKE 100



You'd expect the state's largest city to have a strong music scene, and Omaha delivers with concert venues that pack all kinds of artists and audiences under their roofs. Partially owned by the famed Saddle Creek Records, intimate Slowdown in North Downtown Omaha offers balcony seating and a sunken floor. Hip bands and local barflies mix at O'Leaver's, owned by members of rock band Cursive. Architectural details enhance shows at the 1920s Orpheum Theater, while acoustics shine at the modern Holland Performing Arts Center. Rock and country fans head to the CenturyLink Center for upcoming summer shows, such as Coldplay and Shawn Mendes.

Omaha leads the state in recording studios for up-andcomers and the already famous in the music biz. Saddle Creek Records (with an adjacent shop selling musical merch) hosts native Nebraskan Conor Oberst and his Bright Eyes group. Ware House Productions attracted Lady Gaga, and American Idol winner Jordin Sparks laid down vocals at Rainbow Recording Studios.

Head west to Lincoln's Haymarket district to find shows at Pinnacle Bank Arena, where more than 15.000 fans fill the seats. Artists of all genres play the Bourbon Theatre, a renovated 1920s movie theater, while Broadway musicals and more take the center stage at the Lied Center for Performing Arts.

In Norfolk (northwest of Omaha), Divots Concert Series attracts fans from all over. And in the southwest corner of the state, musicians, usually with folk roots, play shows among exposed brick walls at Sehnert's Bakery and Bieroc Cafe in McCook. Five Rocks Amphitheater in Gering offers a backdrop of Scotts Bluff National Monument.

Listen to your favorite music style at events throughout the state. Evergreens surround the stage at the Pinewood Bowl Theater in Lincoln's Pioneer Park. The sounds of banjos and mandolins fill the air at the North Platte Country Bluegrass Festival at the Lincoln County Fairgrounds. The Nebraska Folk and Roots Festival brings a peaceful, summer jam to the hills of Branched Oak Farm near Raymond. Join jazz-lovers for free shows in July and August at Omaha's Jazz on the Green.

OMAHA ROSE

Founded in 1948, Omaha's Rose Theater continues to produce high-class family shows. Productions in 2017 include *Huck Finn* and *Peter Pan*.

Fantastic Fishing

If you're looking for a list of dream fishing destinations, search no further: Adventures await in Nebraska's lakes, ponds, rivers and streams.


From an angler's perspective, Nebraska truly is a place where north meets south and east meets west. The state's varied geography and climate result in a diversity of habitats and fish, such as brook trout, flathead catfish, panfish species and some of North America's largest freshwater predator fish, including pike and muskies. Thanks to a fishing season that never closes, anglers can target peak times for a variety of species every month of the year.

Spring and early summer bring prime-time fishing for many species. You'll find excellent opportunities for bluegills, largemouth bass and crappies in pits, ponds and small reservoirs throughout the state. At the same time of year, large reservoirs around the state deliver great fishing for walleye, hybrid striped bass and white bass. Catfish aficionados find ample opportunities for channel cats on all of those waters, plus some behemoth flathead and blue

catfish in several reservoirs and in the Platte, Missouri and other state rivers.

The cooler waters in northern and western Nebraska offer anglers even more options. The ever-popular and tasty yellow perch and walleye live in many waters in those parts of the state, along with northern pike and even muskellunge in a few of them. A number of spring-fed streams support year-round populations of brown, rainbow and the occasional brook trout. Stocking has provided even more trout, with cutthroat and tiger trout lurking in a few waters. One of the state's most glamorous trophies awaits below the 55 square miles of water that make up Nebraska's largest reservoir, Lake McConaughy, near Ogallala. The cold water released from the lake's Kingsley Dam creates prime conditions for trophysize rainbow trout.





Five Things You Didn't Know About Nebraska Fishing

- 1) Most of the state's lakes are man-made impoundments, but the Sandhills lakes are natural and uniquely Nebraskan. Nestled in valleys between grass-covered dunes, many of the lakes are incredibly productive fisheries.
- 2) Upstream of Ponca in northeast Nebraska, most of the Missouri River is a relatively "wild" river without channels. In many ways, the river is much like what Lewis and Clark saw. Anglers here find smallmouth bass, sauger and a variety of other species.
- 3) Triple-digit fish in Nebraska? Absolutely. Both blue catfish and paddlefish in the Missouri River can tip the scales at more than 100 pounds. Next in size are flathead catfish, followed by muskellunge. Yes, Nebraska has muskies-big ones.
- 4) Anglers love debating whether trout are native to the state's waters. No one really knows, but if there's any native trout, it's probably the cutthroat.
- 5) Nebraska waters hold about 100 species of fish. Many are minnows, but some 40 types of fish are prime targets for hook and line, and many anglers see how many different ones they can catch.

FREE FISHING EVERY SPRING!

Try Nebraska fishing at no cost on the annual Free Fishing and Park Entry Day, held the Saturday before every Memorial Day weekend. The state waives the requirement for a fishing license and park entry permits, giving everyone a chance to sample outdoor activities. For complete fishing information in the state, including regulations and guides about each area of the state, visit OutdoorNebraska.gov. Be sure to check the site's annual Fishing Forecast for updates on fisheries.



WILLA CATHER Red Cloud

The prairie inspired the author throughout her life. leading her to pen classics such as O Pioneers! and One of Ours, which earned her the 1923 Pulitzer Prize. Visitors to Red Cloud in southcentral Nebraska can tour her family home and see buildings mentioned in her work, including the home of Annie Pavelka, the model for the title character in My Ántonia.



JOHNNY CARSON

Norfolk

No modern media star can match the cultural role Carson played during his 30 years of hosting The Tonight Show. His likable Midwest voice was the last one that millions of viewers heard each night. Carson donated kev mementoes from his career, including **Emmy Awards** and curtains from the show's set, to Norfolk's Elkhorn Valley Museum.



HENRY FONDA

Grand Island and Omaha

Best known for films like The Grapes of Wrath and On Golden Pond, Fonda began acting in 1925 on stage at the Omaha Community Playhouse. Today, the venue annually puts on almost a dozen productions. Born in Grand Island, Fonda and his family moved to Omaha in 1906. The Grand Island home still stands in Railroad Town, part of the Stuhr Museum.

FIRST TERRITORIAL FAIR
Hosted in Nebraska City, the first
territorial fair showcases farm stock,
farm implements, crops, crafts
and more. It was Nebraska's only
territorial fair. In 1868, the state of

Nebraska held its first state fair.

As Todd Williams sat at an outdoor easel in Prague and Italy, painting the great cities and buildings of Europe, a thought came: "I really want to do a collection of paintings from Nebraska."

Several years and thousands of miles later, he's painted a few scenes. One hundred and twenty-two to be precise, at least one from each of the 93 counties in his home state. Some depict historical moments from the Pony Express or the Oregon Trail. Others capture the modern beauty of landmark buildings or the faces of residents, past and present.

As soon as he returned from Europe with the idea, Williams took the concept for the project, called *Painting the Legacy of Nebraska*, to the Nebraska State Historical Society. The challenge, Williams warned, was that it would take about five years to finish, meaning the collection wouldn't be ready until 2017. As he saw the historians' eyes sparkle, Williams realized they'd quickly done the math: A five-year project meant the paintings could debut during the state's sesquicentennial celebration.

Williams began the work in his hometown of Central City (in Merrick

HOMESTEAD ACT

President Abraham Lincoln signs the Homestead Act, granting 160 acres of land to anyone agreeing to live on the land for at least five years. The act prompts thousands of settlers to migrate west to the Nebraska Territory.

County) and its surrounding counties. For several years, he met with county historical societies to unearth the best stories and talked to potential project sponsors. During one meeting, he learned that the owner of Omaha's First National Bank is an art-lover, and soon he had a sponsor for another 15 counties.

When it was time to paint, Williams took his easel and camera on location. He could create the smaller paintings in about three hours, capturing the rapidly shifting sunlight. Sometimes, he returned to his Central City studio and created a larger painting, working from photos.

A few of the scenes surprised even Williams. "I was in Sioux County. in the farthest northwest part of Nebraska," he says. "The sun was setting. We had some Irish music playing. I thought I was in Ireland." In other words, he understands why people often react to the paintings with, "Oh my gosh, that's Nebraska?"


It may take seeing all 93 paintings to understand the full scope of the state's varied settings. "If people could really see this beauty," Williams says, "they'd be amazed at the diversity of the land."





The capitol honors Nebraska's culture. history and natural resources. The Sower, a bronze statue, tops the gold-tile dome. In the vestibule, mosaic images of agriculture, plants and animals represent the "Gifts of Nature to Man on the Plains." Legislative chambers honor both Plains Indians and Euro-American expansion. Twentyone murals adorn the walls, and intricate mosaics decorate the floors. This wealth of public art speaks for and to the people of Nebraska.



Omaha Tribe of Nebraska Hedewaci, Macy

The Umonhon People of the Omaha Tribe of Nebraska host a traditional *hedewaci*, a harvest celebration practiced for hundreds of years. Visitors learn about the culture and heritage of Nebraska's original inhabitants as Umonhon reunite from around the world for dance contests and performances. The event includes Native American food, jewelry, and arts and crafts.





AUGUST 25-SEPTEMBER 4 Nebraska State Fair, Grand Island

Everyone's favorite end-ofsummer tradition promises to be extra-special for the state's sesquicentennial. After all, Nebraska's been putting on a grand champion fair since it was a territory! Check out livestock shows, antique ag equipment displays, big-name entertainment, motorsports and midway rides.

SEPTEMBER 2-4 Old West Balloon Fest, Mitchell

Like many settlers on the plains, J. Sterling Morton and his wife, Caroline, began longing for trees when they arrived in Nebraska City in 1854.



At 10th and Capitol, the new Omaha Marriott Downtown anchors the budding area, with apartments, restaurants and retail planned around





U.S. STRATEGIC AIR COMMAND HEADQUARTERS

Offutt Air Force Base near Bellevue is named SAC's new headquarters. The base has played a key role in the nation's military strength and security for more than a century.



INTERSTATE 80 COMPLETED

Nebraska becomes the first state to finish building its mainline interstate system. "Golden link" brass plates embedded near mile-marker 164 commemorate the last segment laid of the 455-mile, east-west route.



PLAY BALL!

Order up some peanuts and Cracker Jack—the College World Series is here to stay through 2035, hosted at the TD Ameritrade Park Omaha near the historic Old Market entertainment and shopping district. Each June, the nation's best college baseball teams face off in front of more than 24,000 fans.

BIG (ELEPHANT BIG) UPGRADES

Omaha's Henry Doorly Zoo and Aquarium continues to delight visitors with expansions like the 28-acre African Grasslands that opened in 2016. The Grasslands are home to South African elephants, impala, klipspringer and more. Up next, Coastal Shores adds cool pools for its sea lions and polar bears. The pools will surround the Alaskan Adventure splash park.

YEAR-ROUND ATTRACTION

The intimate Lincoln Children's Zoo plans to add 5 acres for new animal exhibits, a zoo school and the Ager Play Center. The \$16 million expansion will allow the zoo to be open yearround, and is scheduled for completion in spring 2019.



PEDAL AND PADDLE

The Crane Trust Nature and Visitor Center in Wood River (14 miles southwest of Grand Island) offers new eco-excursions to experience tallgrass prairie life in the Platte River Valley. Guests kayak through braided rivers, hike among wildflowers, bike deep into the untilled prairie and join guides on safaris to see Sandhill cranes.



WESTERN TRAILS

Cruising Nebraska's roadways today, it's hard to imagine the harrowing journey that yesterday's settlers endured. Major pioneer routes traversed the state, including the Oregon, California and Mormon trails, and the famed Pony Express. Near where the routes converged, the Archway Monument—a museum chronicling the region's role in America's westward expansion spans Interstate-80 near Kearney.

The merged trails formed what essentially became America's first highway, the Great Platte River Road. It led to a frontier world of promise that spoke to pioneers and notables, like Willa Cather and Buffalo Bill Cody. Today, the Western Trails Scenic and Historic Byway covers the same sweeping landscape—but with far more comforts than in a covered wagon.





Omaha

Rails, river and an explorer's mentality once defined Nebraska's largest city, a portal to the West. That spirit of discovery thrives today. Creative shops and galleries pack the historic Old Market district. A unique pedestrian bridge across the Missouri River opens new viewpoints. And an engaging zoo with a domed desert, rainforest and valley of gorillas brings the "wild" back to exploration.

WEEKEND ITINERARY

Day One: Every morning, Lauritzen Gardens opens in scented splendor: a sensory 100-acre botanical oasis of themed gardens, courtyards and a bird sanctuary. The adjacent—and free—Kenefick Park blends landscapes, and two full-size train locomotives take an intriguing loop through the park and Union Pacific Railroad history. The pace picks up just across Interstate-80 at Omaha's Henry Doorly Zoo and Aquarium. Cross a swaying rope bridge over North America's largest indoor rainforest, trek through Gorilla Valley or brave a glass tunnel through a sharkladen aquarium. Downtown, the cobblestone streets of the 1880s Old Market district welcome a wind-down with dining, shops and a microbrewery.

Day Two: Make it a museum trifecta with three different experiences: Vibrant local history at the Durham Museum; sculptures and fine art at the Joslyn Art Museum; and colorful hands-on learning centers

at the Omaha Children's Museum. A quick trip down a wavy slide at Gene Leahy Pedestrian Mall creates Facebook fodder. Slow down while crossing the Bob Kerrey Pedestrian Bridge to reflect on the weekend, watching the full, rosy sun quietly retreat behind the city skyline.

A WALK IN THE PARK Platte River State Park

Tepee lodgings with rattling canvas walls (but wooden floors) create a lost-in-the-woods vibe at this outdoorsy escape between Lincoln and Omaha. The park's highlights include a hidden waterfall along a trail and an observation tower with a spectacular bluff-top vista of the Platte River basin.

Fontenelle Forest

Inspiring 300-year-old bur oaks lift brawny arms over paths in the Missouri River bluffs near the suburb of Bellevue. Nineteen miles of trails carve through this quiet 1,400-acre nature preserve with three environments to explore wetlands, prairie and forest.

Modern design and solid acoustics draw patrons to Holland Performing Arts Center for the Omaha Symphony and touring Broadway productions.





Lincoln

The capital city rustles with energy, feeding off the collegiate atmosphere of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, a unique Art Deco state capitol and two dynamic districts that blend cultural roots with buzzworthy entertainment venues. Even the more tranquil sites, such as museums and gardens, inspire a desire for more.



Day One: Brick warehouses from the 1800s anchor the scene, but today's historic Haymarket district brims with freshness: coffeehouses, bookstores and novel boutiques. Guides at the state capitol reveal the stories behind the unusual Art Deco architecture, including the 15-story domed tower, marble mosaics and a 19-foot bronze statue called The Sower. Near Haymarket, The Railyard amplifies downtown with clubs, concerts and THE CUBE: a massive wraparound video art screen.

Day Two: Family attractions abound around town. The Lincoln Children's Zoo specializes in upclose connections for kids—even a peek at a dwarf croc. The 1930s Sunken Gardens enchants with winding flowerbeds, lily ponds


and reflecting pavilions. Science and crafts turn learning into a fun adventure at the Lincoln Children's Museum, with displays including a 3-story cuckoo clock that implodes (don't worry, it's foam). Finish at the University of Nebraska State Museum for paleontology and weaponry exhibits, and a "nightcap" of a star-studded display at Mueller Planetarium.

A WALK IN THE PARK

Eugene T. Mahoney State Park

Water gushes and sprays at the water park amid shouts of delight. Trails disappear into the trees. Balls rattle into mini-golf cups. Fishing reels buzz as kids fight fish. It's the best of both worlds: an actionpacked family park near Ashland (24 miles northeast of Lincoln) with the Platte River bluffs as the stage.








East

The storied Missouri River, a legendary force in exploratory history, remains a scenic force in Nebraska's eastern region. Its spirit emerges as visitors paddle quiet waters and spy wildlife clustered in backwaters. And a sense of discovery swells in spectacular state parks, overlooks, small towns and cities along the riverbanks, including the wooded destination of Nebraska City.

OVERNIGHT ITINERARY

A tree house, lifted 50 feet among gently swaying limbs, brings fresh perspective to the heritage of Nebraska City. But the story is in the roots, especially in Arbor Lodge State Historical Park, home of Arbor Day founder J. Sterling Morton.

Morton's 52-room mansion sits on 72 acres of hilly, woodsy grounds. When Morton arrived in 1872, he planted apple orchards, peach trees, evergreens and cottonwoods. His love of trees brought about the national observance, and his impact remains on display. The interpretive Tree House Trail points out some of 260 species of trees and shrubs. At Tree Adventure, a wagon rattles riders into backwoods. The tree house beckons for a canopy-high climb, and the historic Morton barns on the Arbor Day Farm share ground-level history.

But Nebraska City contains more than trees. ArborLinks offers nearby golf, and the bluff-top Lewis and Clark Missouri River Basin Visitors Center echoes the view the explorers once had. The site also celebrates scientific discoveries that they jotted into their journals: 178 new plants and 122 new animals, including the bobcat and beaver.

Spend the night at the Lied Lodge and Conference Center with its soaring fireplace and Timber Dining Room serving steaks and seafood.

A WALK IN THE PARK

Indian Cave State Park

The namesake draw: preserved prehistoric petroglyphs inside the sandstone cave. But this wooded park near Shubert also features ample aboveground attractions including biking and a partially restored historic town.

Niobrara State Park

Popular with wildlife photographers, this park nestles in the northeast hills. Cabins overlook the Missouri and Niobrara river confluence. An interpretive center shares history, and cowboy storytellers spice up summer buffalo cookouts.

Ponca State Park

Forested hills, 22 miles of trails for hikers, horses and mountain bikes. and Missouri River access make this Ponca destination popular. So do the park's educational programs on topics like birding and archery.

HOT FIND

An oft-overlooked spot in Nebraska City: the Museum of Firefighting and Education Center, where kids play dress-up on a 1966 American LaFrance engine.





Central

Scattered wisps of clouds struggle to cover the immensity of open sky in this region of the state. Mixed-grass prairies and dunes roll ceaselessly to the horizon. A breeze ripples past, lost in the vastness. Welcome to Nebraska's north-central Sandhills: simple beauty on a big scale that invites frequent stops to capture and absorb surroundings abundant with wildlife and majesty.



Day One: Grand Island

Rise early and wander deep into the awakening prairie and marshes of the Platte River valley, one of the nation's best birding sites and migratory home of the flamboyant Sandhill crane. As a spring day begins, hundreds of species of waterfowl and birds come to honking, trilling life. Another treat: the architecturally geometric Stuhr Museum of the Prairie Pioneer, with its 200 surrounding acres of living history. Downtown Grand Island blends modern art galleries and boutiques with a cornerstone 1930s Art Deco Grand Theatre.

Day Two: Nebraska National **Forests and Grasslands**

Broaden the landscape experience in this region featuring three national grasslands and two national forests. Near Halsey, hiking trails thread deep into the Bessey Recreation Complex, and the signature Scott Lookout Tower


offers panoramic views. Subtler attractions await, too, such as the shallow, slow-wandering Middle Loup River.


A WALK IN THE PARK Smith Falls State Park

Streams of silver cascade 70 feet down a stony cliff. Spray mists the air above a viewing deck. Smith Falls, Nebraska's highest waterfall, highlights this park 14 miles east of Valentine, but visitors also come for kayaking, tubing and exploring the Niobrara, a national scenic river.

Fort Niobrara National Wildlife Refuge

Prairie chickens, once nearly extinct, open orange throats and produce a distinct ooh-loo-loo sound during spring mating season. Shaggy bison turn and stare. This 19,000-acre north-central tract, a former frontier military fort, became a preserve in 1912 when Teddy Roosevelt set it aside to protect Great Plains plants and animals.










GRAND

In Grand Island, savor Italian creations at Napoli's Italian Restaurant and Wine Bar. For a cultural switch, try creative sushi rolls at Wasabi Bistro.







West

The land here comes with beautiful, authentic grit. Dust kicks up and swirls across a rugged landscape of badland buttes and valleys, wiry pines and tumbleweeds. Cowboy culture makes this a place ripe for exploration, with its horses, living heritage and at night, a stirring display of stars exploding in a sky black as gunpowder.

WEEKEND ITINERARY

Day One: The archeologically packed Fossil Freeway leads to new appreciation of ancient times. Along the route: the Agate Fossil Beds National Monument (and its bizarre fossilized beardog) and the Hudson-Meng Education and Research Center, where prehistoric people captured and killed countless bison near Crawford. The Toadstool Geologic Park in Harrison displays otherworldly formations carved by badland erosion. Cowboy cooking rules at Crawford's High Plains Homestead and the Drifter Cookshack.

Day Two: Beads, knives, kettles even playing cards—illustrate the world of early trade at Museum of the Fur Trade, built at the site of an 1837 trading post in Chadron. The world of exploration awaits as well, with hiking at the western portion of the Nebraska National Forest near Chadron and the boundless Oglala National Grassland north

of Crawford. Pronghorn deer and prairie dogs make occasional appearances along the way.

A WALK IN THE PARK

Chadron State Park

Rugged buttes, stone cliffs and dead-end canyons beckon horseback riders, hikers and mountain bikers to follow winding trails through Nebraska's oldest state park (established in 1921). Back at camp, cabins and swimming pools repay a day's journey.

Fort Robinson State Park

Why imagine the Old West when you can live it instead? Buildings from as far back as 1874 (when the original fort existed) remain in use, many for lodging. Stagecoaches tour the impressive buttes. Bison and bighorn sheep graze the 22,000 acres. And the mountainous Pine Ridge scenery creates a timeless backdrop for paddling, golfing or gazing into the past.

RANCH LIFE

With cabins near Crawford, Ponderosa Ranch caters to visitors who hunt wild turkeys and deer. Also, get great photos of trains rumbling across bluffs.

Splish Splash

Cool off with buckets of summer fun at the state's water parks and swimming pools.

Surfing in Nebraska? It's possible at Pawnee Plunge water park in Columbus (84 miles northwest of Omaha). The state's only FlowRider surfing simulator lets surfers try to balance on big waves. For a milder experience, tube down the Lazy River or watch little ones scramble over the Explorer Ship, with its water cannon and toddlerfriendly slides.

Thrill-seekers scream into a watery entry after plummeting down one of the six-story-tall, high-speed water slides at Island Oasis Water Park in Grand Island. If tame is your game, a 350,000-gallon wave pool with a zero-depth access is an easier way to get in the swim.

Find thrills for the entire family at Hastings Aquacourt Water Park. Toddlers tag along on a family water slide, while older kids cannonball down the zippy tube slide. This park also contains a big wave pool and a river float, plus, it's less crowded than most water parks.

Hang onto your inner tube and float in the wave pool at the Eugene T. Mahoney State Park's Family Aquatic Center in Ashland. This



700-acre state park along the bluffs of the Platte River also features hiking, camping, an arboretum, a miniature golf course, and an arts and crafts center.


Kids can channel their inner boppers on the boogie-woogie keyboard at Norfolk's AquaVenture Water Park in the northeast part of the state. The 8-foot-wide, foot-activated keyboard sprays as it plays. And a 310-foot-long slide courses through a dark tube with spiraling stripes of light for a thrilling experience.


The Big Blue Water Park in Beatrice (44 miles south of Lincoln) is so big there's rarely a crowd in the 9,000-square-foot pool. Little ones splash in the kiddie pool with its bubbling fountain; the bigger kids head for the water slides and diving boards.

LOOK OUT BELOW!

Water towers at Mahoney State Park and at Splash Station in Fremont dump thundering cascades of water into the pool every few minutes. Also at Splash Station, a colorful train engine beckons younger kids with easy stairs and water slides.

Delightful Discoveries

Bubbles big enough to encapsulate a child, and light and sound waves made of flame are some of the ways entertaining educators demonstrate how science works at the Edgerton Explorit Center in Aurora (22 miles east of Grand Island). The popular Explorit Zone includes more than 30 hands-on exhibits. Kids beware: There's a good chance you'll need to drag your parents away from the fullmotion flight simulator.

The Archway monument and museum spans Interstate-80 near Kearney. It's worth a stop at the 310-foot-long Archway to see how pioneers persevered along the Oregon Trail, when bison stampedes

were still a threat. Outside the museum, kids follow a 4,800-square-foot labyrinth in the TrailBlaze Maze; parents watch from the Maze Overlook.

See an actual Pony Express Station at Minden's Pioneer Village southeast of Kearney, where more than 50,000 pieces of Americana fill 28 buildings. Car buffs appreciate the 350-piece automobile collection, which shows the evolution of transportation.

Some 12 million years ago, northeast Nebraska was home to giant tortoises, saber-toothed deer, raccoon dogs and the barrel-bodied rhino. At Ashfall Fossil Beds State Historical Park in Royal, watch paleontologists as they work to uncover Nebraska's prehistoric past from this rare fossil bed.

More than 200 amazing skeletons are preserved for viewing, and interpretive guides field questions from visitors.

CHILDREN'S MUSEUMS


Age-appropriate educational toys, interactive displays and engaging lectures make these specialty museums ideal for eager minds.

- · At the Omaha Children's Museum, the Fantastic Future Me exhibit lets kids digitally enhance their image with mixand-match career-type outfits, such as a doctor's coat and stethoscope, football helmet and chef's hat.
- Burrow out of sight in the kid-size Prairie Dog Tunnels exhibit at the Lincoln Children's Museum.
- At the North Platte Area Children's Museum, youngsters role-play as actors and doctors.
- Experiment with microscopes and a Braille writing machine at the York Area Children's Museum.

SAC MUSEUM

At the Strategic Air Command and Aerospace Museum in Ashland, visitors see an awe-inspiring collection of some of the mightiest airplanes and rockets ever built. Walk right up next to many of the carefully restored aircraft, including World War II bombers, Cold War fighters and an Atlantis shuttle trainer of the type used by Nebraska astronaut Clayton Anderson. Kids gravitate to the state-of-the-art flight simulators, where they can strap in for anything from a scenic cruise to a combat mission.





Wild Things


Visitors to Omaha's Henry Doorly Zoo and Aquarium see snakes up close in the Desert Dome's Rattlesnake Canyon, the largest indoor rattlesnake exhibit in the world. Kids climb through a tunnel and pop up in observation bubbles inside Gorilla Valley, where they're face-to-face with massive primates. At the aquarium, tanks of slowly undulating jellyfish in fantastic shapes and colors mesmerize your troupe. With 1,200 species on 140 acres, this zoo—rated by TripAdvisor as one of the top 10 in the world requires at least a full day to navigate.

The original miniature Iron Horse train (now 50 years old) takes visitors on a one-mile loop to get a look at some of the Lincoln Children's Zoo's more than 350 animals. At the primate exhibit, visitors try to spot the pygmy marmosets—the smallest monkeys in the world. And kids with energy to burn dive into the giant sandbox and scramble up a rope wall.

Intriguing creatures lurk beneath the surface of Nebraska's lakes and rivers, and you can see many of them at the AkSarBen Aguarium in Gretna (15 miles southwest of Omaha) on the banks of the Platte River. You'll do a double take when you see the prehistoric paddlefish, with their long, shovel-like snouts. Guests walk past 12 exhibits of freshwater fish and amphibians at this aguarium.

When an elk bugles, the eerie call will likely grab your attention. That's one of the wild encounters you might experience at the Lee G. Simmons Conservation Park and Wildlife Safari in Ashland. A 4-mile driving trail brings you up close to the free-roaming bison, deer and elk on the park's 440 acres of natural wetlands and prairies. Scramble up the Viewing Tower to get a birds-eye look at the herons, Sandhill cranes and trumpeter swans living on 10-acre Crane Meadows. Wolf Canyon overlook provides access to hiking trails and to views of black bears and gray wolves.

Did you know the Colombian black-headed spider monkey has a fingerprint—on the tip of its tail? That's just one of the fun facts you'll uncover at Scottsbluff's Riverside Discovery Center, a 25-acre zoo and education facility in western Nebraska. The center houses about 175 animals and specializes in protecting and breeding threatened and endangered species from around the world. Kids get down and dirty in the Dino Dig, where they experience the hands-on thrill of uncovering Tyrannosaurus bones. Young paleontologists cool off at the Splash Pad, a watery playground with fountains and jets.

A weekend at one of Nebraska's largest lakes provides plenty of chances to get your fix of beaches and boating.

The unchallenged star among Nebraska's watery playgrounds is the vast Lake McConaughy near Ogallala. The 22-mile-long reservoir known as Big Mac lays among the rolling Sandhills of the Great Plains in western Nebraska just off Interstate-80. The lake's coves and 35,700 surface acres of water welcome tens of thousands of visitors each year. Vast sandy beaches are open to camping and bonfires, providing an unexpected venue for evening beach parties. Along with the usual boating activities, McConaughy's visitors enjoy piloting sailboats and parasailing... or just watching the action.

In July, colorful kites soar and sand architects display serious creativity during Kites and Castles, Big Mac's premier summer annual event.

Trips to Big Mac always include at least a few hours in nearby Ogallala, one of the greatest cow towns of the cattle drive era in the 1870s. Today, the town continues to celebrate its cowboy heritage. Front Street, a replica of a line of Old West storefronts, gives travelers a taste of trail life at the free Cowboy Museum. Visitors eat and drink their fill at the Crystal Palace Saloon, where actors entertain with

a dance-hall revue at Nebraska's longest-running summer stock theater production.

If you wind up with a rainy day at the lake or just want a little time out of the sun, make a quick trip 20 miles east on US-30 to Paxton for a truly unique dining experience. Local resident Rosser "Ole" Herstedt swung open his tavern doors on the heels of Prohibition's end in Nebraska and set about decorating his establishment with trophies from 35 years of hunting safaris. Today, Ole's Big Game Steakhouse and Lounge provides a museum of mounted exotic animals packed into an otherwise typical small-town steakhouse. You'll find species, such as a polar bear and giraffe, along with some seriously quirky displays, such as a baboon wearing a ball cap atop the jukebox.

BIG MAC

Lake McConaughy, the state's largest lake, has 100 miles of shoreline, great fishing and steady prairie winds that sailors love. Learn more about the state's lakes at VisitNebraska.com.

Harlan County Reservoir, Republican City

Harlan County Reservoir draws sportsmen to the Nebraska-Kansas border southwest of Kearney. Anglers reel in walleye, pike and other trophies on the 7-milelong lake, which has 75 miles of shoreline. Hunting seasons bring outdoorsmen pursuing pheasant, waterfowl and turkeys, along with both white-tailed and mule deer. Miles of trails offer chances for bird watching and spotting prairie dogs scampering across the prairie.






A marina at this fishing and camping hot spot northwest of Lincoln has all you need for a day on the lake, and an equestrian campground for riders exploring lakefront trails.










Scenic Camping

A wide array of campgrounds across the state let you mix up the geography and overnight accommodations during your stays.

Chadron State Park, Nebraska's first state park, draws visitors to northwest Nebraska with its rugged beauty and historic sites. Campers set up amid pine forests and bluffs and explore trails. The nearby Museum of the Fur Trade stands on the site of an 1837 trading post and tells the story of the rugged trappers, traders and Native Americans who once worked the wilderness of the West. Nearby in Crawford is Fort Robinson State Park, one of the jewels of western

Nebraska. The sprawling property still includes buildings of the 19th-century cavalry fort that played a huge role in Western history (famed Lakota leader Crazy Horse died here) and World War II, when cavalry horses were trained here. Guests camp on the grounds or stay in motel-style rooms in the former Army buildings.

For another unusual stay, try sleeping in one of 10 restored Union Pacific cabooses at Two Rivers State Recreation Area west of Omaha. Along with a brag-worthy weekend experience, it's a fitting way to commemorate the state's proud railroad heritage. For another

unique overnight, campers at Platte River State Park between Lincoln and Omaha can spread their sleeping bags in Native American tepees with wood floors or choose modern camping cabins.

Other notable parks with camping cabins include Ponca State Park and Lewis and Clark State Recreation Area in the northeast part of the state, and Medicine Creek Reservoir in southcentral Nebraska. The state's most luxurious camping options wait at Eugene T. Mahoney State Park near I-80 between Lincoln and Omaha. Along with plenty of tent and RV sites, the park includes a lodge, numerous cabins, a water park and a theater.

GLAMPING



Falling into a landscape painting may feel like this: a canvas of golden prairie and pale-blue sky without borders. An immense beauty that swallows you up, luring you toward the horizon. In the mid-1800s, much of America's enduring legacy was formed on the flat trails that traced the Platte River across the Great Plains, branching in turn for Oregon, California and Utah, where Mormons sought sanctuary. The railroad eventually took its place in the river valley, and then Interstate-80, which wasn't completed here until 1974.

Today's drivers head off into a land just as big, with discoveries waiting along the interstate itself and the slower highways heading into the surrounding prairie.

South of Lincoln, the Homestead National Monument of America in Beatrice makes a great starting point for any pioneer-themed tour. The visitors center tells the story of the Homestead Act of 1862. which made Western land available to average citizens and helped spur much of the migration along the nation's famous trails. RAILS ROA

In central Nebraska. discoveries begin just north of I-80

at Aurora's Plainsman Museum. where the collection highlights military heritage and early farm culture. In the same town, The Edgerton Explorit Center grabs kids' attention with hands-on science exhibits. The center is named for Dr. Harold "Doc" Edgerton, an MIT professor and inventor whom you'd know best as the guy who did those slo-mo photos of bullets piercing apples and playing cards.

A little west on I-80, blacksmiths pound orange-hot steel into sparks

and ironworks at the Stuhr Museum of the Prairie Pioneer, a late 19th-century village brought to life in Grand Island. The large

campus includes a complete 1896 village dubbed Railroad Town and staffed in summer with historians who educate visitors.

Straight south of Grand Island near Red Cloud, 612 acres of native Willa Cather Memorial Prairie lush with wildflowers, grasses and wildlife carry the same sweeping experience the famed novelist remembered from her childhood here. Visitors can see what she described: "The red of the grass made all the great prairie the colour of wine-stains And there was so much motion in it: the whole country seemed, somehow, to be running." The author's trim childhood home, part of the Willa Cather State Historic Site,

anchors a neighborhood stroll past other important sites in her life and writings, including the 1885 Red Cloud Opera House. The refurbished 1886 Kaley House on what she called Quality Street serves a memorable bed-andbreakfast todav.

As travelers resume the journey west on I-80, they reach Kearney and one of the most memorable landmarks on the road's 2,900mile length. The Archway spans the highway. Inside, the museum's high-tech exhibits highlight 170 years of travel along the river, and windows offer a rare view of passing cars from above the middle of the interstate.

Southeast of Kearney, one of the state's longest-running attractions waits in Minden. Harold Warp Pioneer Village opened in 1953 and remains a 20-acre timepiece with 50,000 items and 26 buildings, such as a frontier fort and a Pony Express relay station.

The prairie lends itself to largescale wonders, such as Golden Spike Tower in North Platte, which gives visitors a panoramic view of the web of iron tracks and streams of locomotives in the massive rail yard. On the edge of North Platte, the larger-than-life mystique of famed showman William F. Cody is on display in his mansion and barns at the Buffalo Bill Ranch State Historical Park.

As drivers head for Nebraska's western border, they come to the grand natural attractions that most pioneers noted as landmarks in their journals. Wagon ruts and granite markers dot the bluffs and valleys of Ash Hollow State Historical Park near Lewellen. Formations lift like stone sculptures from the plains at Courthouse Rock, Jail Rock and Chimney Rock. Gering's Legacy of the Plains Museum celebrates the Oregon Trail and Nebraska history against a magnificent backdrop at the Scotts Bluff National Monument.

FORT ATKINSON STATE HISTORICAL PARK


Cannons pound with drama, but even the brooding, low-slung structures reveal a deep, compelling sense of history. Part of a 154-acre 1820 garrison, the first built west of the Missouri River, this Fort Calhoun site near the Missouri River once housed a quarter of the American Army and guarded the American fur trade as the gateway to the West.

WESSELS LIVING **HISTORY FARM**

A signature red post-and-beam barn, farmhouse, granary, poultry house and gold-plated Dempster windmill mark 145 acres of farm heritage. The site, one mile south of I-80 at exit 353 near York, shares agricultural history from the 1920s through today.

FORT HARTSUFF STATE HISTORICAL PARK

Blue-coated period soldiers relate life during the Plains Indian Wars (1870s and 1880s), with details about their rifles and how settlers took refuge in the original fort's limestone and concrete buildings, nine of which still remain. The site is near Burwell, north of I-80.
